Editorial

During this week around 2000 young people between 18-35 years old from all over the world gathered in Taizé for a special week. The programme included workshops in which people from different continents, international organizations, christian communities and local initiatives of solidarity have participated. Young adults with an amazing variety of life and work situations had the chance to meet and discuss their future seen through the light of our shared hope and faith.



Feedback from the Workshops

This week, more than 60 workshops were offered to the young adults who took part in the special "Reflection Week". Here are some thoughts inspired from two of these workshops.

One heart at a time...

Jean Vanier and the members of L'Arche Community want to encourage us "to change the world one heart at a time".

They touched our hearts with their humble and authentic testimonies of their lives. On Wednesday's workshop Jean Vanier reminded us that the opposite of peace is not war but fear. Fear of humiliation, fear of losing our sense of power and control is what creates breaches among us; peace will come when each one of us learns to love those who are different. Jean Vanier reflected on how we always want to change people, but we rarely want to meet them. He insists, however, that we are meant to meet each other to discover how beautiful we are.

Sounds praise the Lord

On Tuesday, there was a piano recital by Peter Bannister (Cambridge UK): "Strings and keys, praise the Lord".

The participants had an opportunity to listen to romantic and modern pieces, representing the so-called programme music—that is music that illustrates some aspect of visual or metaphysical reality. In this case, these were compositions referring to moments from history of Christianity, aimed to praise God. Peter Bannister played on a 150-year-old instrument from the famous Blüthner manufacture - an instrument that belonged to Brother Roger's aunt.

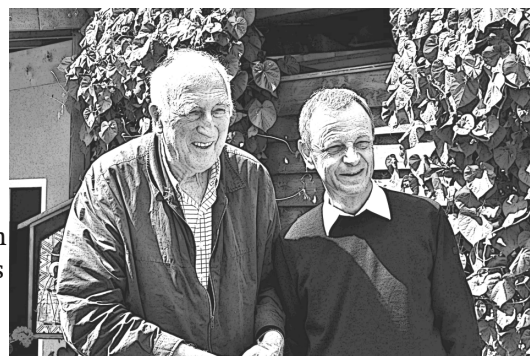
Human Responsibility and Search for God

On Thursday evening, Brother Alois, prior of Taizé, spoke at the end of evening prayer. The full text of his meditation is online on the Taizé website www.taize.fr/en

This week, we are having many exchanges concerning our responsibility as Christians in our societies. At the same time, we are going together to the sources of faith, by means of common prayer and meditating on Scripture. Human responsibility and the search for God, these two realities are so inseparable.

It is the third year that we are holding such a week of deeper searching on the hill, supported by the very precious presence of speakers from various backgrounds and to whom we express our gratitude. I will mention only one by name: the beloved Jean Vanier. (...)

Last Sunday, we remembered that Brother Roger arrived in Taizé for the first time on 20 August 1940. From the beginning, he was aware that a life of prayer was inseparable from compassion and solidarity with those most abused by existence, at the time the war refugees that he hid. Even when alone, he prayed three times a day. These days we sing words that were already important to him in those long-ago times: "Blessed is the one who abandons himself to you, O God; you keep us in joy, simplicity and mercy."

From Congo, exiled in Italy

Faustin Gahima is a solidarity activist from Democratic Republic of Congo.

'Tumaini' means 'hope' in Swahili. Convinced of God's presence in our lives, I try to respond to his grace by helping people help others. I work with the victims of war and injustice, especially widows and orphans of the war in Congo. From Congo, exiled in Italy, I work to help my own family and those who risk falling into despair.

Serving the most vulnerable.

Janina Ochojska, founder and president of "Polish Humanitarian Action":

I strongly believe that each of us has a very important influence on other's human lives. The way in which we live positively or negatively affects the life of people living in the poorest countries. That's why, we, citizens of the rich countries are responsible for our actions. In Taizé, I've met young people who will be responsible in the future of the world. I wish you a courage to serve the most vulnerable people to give them the possibility of development.

Building meaningful projects

Miroslav Vrankic (Croatia) is an entrepreneur and a professor of electrical engineering

My passion is building meaningful projects, by merging my scientific background in electrical engineering with assistive technology applications that can change people's lives for the better. We are also organizing an international conference on assistive technology for people with disabilities.

How do I find my way?

Katharina Opalka (Germany) is a Protestant theologian.

The Bible and our tradition provide us with an abundance of images of God: God – the Almighty; Love; Father, Son and Spirit; fire and whisper. In my research as a protestant theologian, I am interested in these images and the effect they may have on us: How they may bring me down to my knees – and let me face the world anew when I look up. How they may help me to cope with feeling powerless in face of the ups and downs of the world.

The scandal of inequalities in the world

Dr. Christoph Benn has been a co-founder of the Global Fund and a senior director since its creation. He has worked as a physician in the UK, Germany and Tanzania.

What can we do about the scandal of growing inequalities in the world? The aim of the workshop is to reflect on the challenge of growing inequalities both at the global and the national level. At the global level, the Global Fund to fight AIDS, tuberculosis and malaria has become a key instrument to reduce inequalities in access to health care.

Freedom Singers

The singers of this Burmese choir are from six of the over 130 different ethnic groups in Myanmar; Karen, Kachin, Lahu, Wa, Chin and Shan.

In Sweden, they have met with Swedish choral singers and have shared faith and life in singing and music making, conversations and common activities. Together they formed Freedom singers. They hope to voice hope, peace and joy with their melodies from Myanmar, Sweden and other parts of the world.



Sisters Entwined

Agata Kroh, professor of Hebrew and Jewish culture (Poland)

We read in Genesis that God blessed humankind and gave us dominion over creation (1:28). What does it mean? For many centuries this verse served as a justification for the exploitation of the earth in an unrestricted way. Today, in the face of worldwide ecological challenges, we urgently need to reconsider our commitment to protect the earth. It does not mean to dismiss the biblical text, rather, to comprehend it anew. As a great Jewish scholar and rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel put it, what we need is "radical amazement". In order not to give in to discouragement, let us search for practical, scientific solutions to the environmental crisis, but also for a deeper understanding of human presence in the world, in brotherhood with all creation. "Wonderful are your works" (Ps 139:14).
